


Foundation: 1926

#### I. Historical Background [1926 – 1946]

During the infant years of Feeding Hills, the Catholic people attended churches in North Agawam, West Springfield and Springfield, with the hope that someday they would have a church of their own.

In the fall of 1926, a portable wooden Chapel, which had been used in St. Anthony's church in North Agawam, was dismantled and carried by truck to William Street in Feeding Hills. It was a mission Chapel of Mount Carmel Church and the Stigmatine fathers celebrated Mass there each Sunday.

In June of 1944, Rev. Adolph Ferrari, CSS was placed in charge of the Mission Church of Feeding Hills.

In February of 1946, the late Bishop Thomas M. O'Leary declared a Territorial Parish in Feeding Hills. The place of worship was to be at Sacred Heart Church on William Street.

#### II. Towards to the erection and dedication of the Church [1946 – 1959]

In February of 1946, Rev. Leonard Della Badia, CSS was assigned as first Pastor of the Sacred Heart Church. At the time of its founding, the Parish consisted of 175 families. The portable Church could only seat 125 people and was much too small for the growing community. From 1946 to 1959, the Parishioners worked and saved and prayed that they might be able to build a Church large enough for all the Catholics in Feeding Hills.

In 1948, through the untiring efforts of Father Leonard Della Badia, approximately 12 acres of land were purchased at the corner of Springfield, Mill and Poplar Streets on which the new Church, Social Center and Recreation Area now stand.

On June, 1956, Father George Linse, CSS, was assigned as Pastor of Sacred Heart Church.

On January, 1958, Bishop Christopher J. Weldon granted the Parish permission to erect a new Church. Fr. Linse worked feverishly for a new Church, and on June 20, 1959 the new church was dedicated.

The first Mass was celebrated in the new Church on Sunday, June 21, 1959.

The growth of the parish in the first ten years was from 500 parishioners in 1946 to 1,827 in 1956.

#### III. Towards the Silver Jubilee [1960 – 1971]

On July, 1961 the Pavilion on Church grounds was completed.

On August 12, 1962 the electronic bells were installed in the new Church. They rang for the first time on August 19, 1962.

On January 14, 1963, Fr. Joseph Henchey, Assistant Pastor, left for his new assignment in Virginia. And on January 20 Fr. Richard Farrell was assigned as new Assistant Pastor of Sacred Heart Church.

On August, 1964, Father Richard Farrell was transferred to Virginia, and Fr. David Gallagher was assigned as Assistant Pastor.

On November 23, 1965, Fr. James Shea was assigned as Assistant Pastor of the Sacred Heart Church.

In 1966, the growth of the Parish in the last ten years was from 1,825 parishioners in 1956 to 3,308 in 1966. And in the same year there was a purchase of three acres of property on Poplar Street, adjoining the present church property.

On February, 1967, the mortgage on the new Church was paid off.

On July, 1967, there was purchased the Rectory at 1103 Springfield Street. Later on, in November, there was sold the Rectory at 1100 Springfield Street.

On June 2, 1968, Fr. James Shea celebrated the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his Ordination into the Priesthood.

On June 16, 1968, Fr. George Linse celebrated the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his Ordination into the Priesthood.

Through the untiring efforts of Father Linse, the Bishop approved the erection of our new Social Center in the year 1970, and this beautiful building was completed and dedicated by Bishop Christopher J. Weldon on January 17, 1971.

And on 1971 the Sacred Heart Parish in Feeding Hills celebrated its Silver Jubilee!

#### IV. Towards the Future [From 1972 on]

Thirty-three years have elapsed since several men of the Parish carried our former Sacred Heart Church from North Agawan and reassembled it in Feeding Hills. Because of the growth of our families and the advent of many new parishioners, it was not long before the chapel was filled to capacity and overflowing each Sunday morning. Plans were then made to erect a new church which would be a fitting abode for the house of God and witch would comfortably accommodate our parishioners for the present and also the future.

With the support, encouragement, zeal and sacrifice of our good people, ground was broken May 16, 1958, and a year later one of the most beautiful churches in this part of the State was dedicated June 20, 1959.

It is with deep gratitude to Almighty God that we dedicate this beautiful church and it is with sincere appreciation to each one of our good parishioners for making the erection of this church possible.

Now we can truly say:

"I have loved, O Lord, The beauty of Thy house And the place where Thy glory dwells."

May our beautiful and stately new church always remain an exterior sign of the inner spiritual goodness, piety and holiness of the people of Feeding Hills.

#### History of the Sacred Heart Church

In the early days of Catholic Church history in Agawam, Catholics living in Feeding Hills attended churches in North Agawam and West Springfield. In the Fall of 1926, the Sacred Heart Church, a small wooden structure, was erected on William Street in Feeding Hills. This was the former St. Anthony's Church which had been dismantled and carried by truck to its present location. The men of the parish built the foundation and cellar. At the time it was a mission chapel affiliated with St. Anthony's Church, Stigmatine Fathers from St. Anthony's and St. Ann's parishes said one Mass in the church each Sunday. In the year 1944, Rev. Adolph Ferrari, C.P.S., was placed in charge of the church, and, under his leadership, a kitchen, office and lavatories were added to the original structure.

The late Bishop Thomas M. O'Leary of Springfield raised the Sacred Heart Church from a mission chapel to that of a parish embracing all the territory and Catholics of Feeding Hills, in March of 1946. At that time there were one hundred and seventy-five families comprise the membership of the Sacred Heart Church.

In June of 1946, Rev. Leonard Della Badia, C.P.S., was sent to the newly-formed territorial parish. With much zeal and great interest, he immediately began the important work of organizing the youth and adults of the parish. The Catholic Youth Organization was formed in the parish in 1946. In November of 1946, the Rosary Altar Society was established, followed by the Holy Name Society in February, 1947, and the Sacred Heart AC in March, 1948.

In February of 1948, the Homer S. Flower estate on the corner of Springfield, Mill and Poplar streets, and consisting of 12 acres of land, was purchased by the Sacred Heart Parish as a site for its future church.

In the month of June, 1956, Rev. Leonard Della Badia, C.P.S., was transferred to the Sacred Heart Church, Timmins, Ontario, and Rev. George Linse, C.P.S., succeeded him as pastor, with Rev. Francis Keefe, C.P.S. as assistant. For the next two years, religious, social and financial activities were sponsored by the parish, and in January, 1958, His Excellency, Most Reverend Bishop Christopher J. Weldon, granted permission to erect a new church.

After months of planning and discussions, ground was broken by the Bishop in May of 1958 for the new and modernistic church. The design decided upon was a semi-circular building with many functional aspects. It has a seating capacity of 850 persons, with the farthest seat from the altar only thirteen paws distant. A wonderful feature of this design is the fact that regardless where a person may sit, his view will be unobstructed for there are no pillar or posts anywhere inside the church. There is a glass enclosed room in the church, completely sound-proof for mothers with small children. Colored glass windows around the entire expanse of the building offer ample natural lightning. For the convenience of the young and old alike, the church has only one step at the entrance. The church is landscaped with lawns and flower beds. A parking lot sufficiently large to accommodate all cars was erected to the one side of the church.

On Saturday, June 20, the new church was dedicated and the first Masses were celebrated the following day.

#### Description of

#### **Our Stained Glass Windows**

The tall cross outside the entrance reminds all men that Christ said "If I be lifted up from the world I will draw all men to me". The cross in stained glass over the door to the church shows that some have been drawn by the cross and are willing to try to follow Christ's advice: "Take up your cross and follow me". The stained glass cross is red, symbol of love and courage; and blue, symbol of faith. From God's love and truth emanate rays of His grace, goodness, and joy (which are yellow, and rays of hope green). The windows reach like arms around all those in the church, and the rays shine to the ends. The background pieces of many colors are dark at the far ends (that's us far away from the cross), but get brighter and lighter as they get nearer the cross. Being human our progress is uneven, which is represented by the rhythmical progression in each window of (3) sections.


The inner semi-circle around the altar has a chalice and host in the center, for Christ has given us Himself as our reward for following Him. These windows are lighter than the others to make the altar the brightest spot in the church.

In Noah's time, the earth was cleansed by a flood and in Baptism we are cleansed by holy water. After the flood, God put the rainbow in the sky. In the Baptistry, the windows are arranged as a rainbow. Light at the top denoting God's grace coming to us, and dark at the bottom, the evil being put down.

April 27 October	The Parish Council was organized. Edward Shore, Manager of the West Springfield Coliseum visited the Church grounds. He donated \$400.00 to get a skating rink at our Recreation Field into operation. This rink is west of the No. 1 Baseball Diamond.
December	A rink fence was installed around the skating rink. A portable trailer was purchased from the Grossman Lumber Company of Braintree, Mass. This trailer was converted into a large room located at the rink. The room has four large windows overlooking the rink and is heated making it very comfortable for the children to put on and take off their skates.

1970 January	1	The first outdoor Hockey Game was played on the new skating rink.
March May November	8 26 22	The first Vigil Mass was celebrated in our Church. Started construction of our new Social Center Building. The first Christmas Bazaar, sponsored by the Parish, was held at the new Social Center. The Center had not been totally completed and dedicated as yet.
1971		
January	17	Our new Social Center was dedicated by Bishop Christopher J. Weldon. The CCD Classes were being conducted in the new Social Center with approximately 1,000 children enrolled.
February		Father James Shea, four councilors (all high school boys) and 43 children of the Parish made a bus trip to Washington, D. C. The trip included stops at West Point, an overnight stay at Mt. Carmel Church at White Plains, N. Y., a brief visit to New York and then on to Woodbridge, Va. The children were quartered
		at Our Lady of Angel Church Hall in Woodbridge during their stay at Washington. The group commuted from Woodbridge to Washington where they visited the Capitol, the White House and all the historical sites. The last day of their trip consisted of a trip to New York City where the group took in a wonderful show. This has been an annual affair for about three years.
April		The Sacred Heart Basketball League concluded another very fine season with Stanley Chmielewski as Basketball Commissioner. About 180 children participated in the league. The league consisted of six 8–10 year old teams, six 10–12 year old teams and three 13–15 year old teams.
May	5	The Sacred Heart Little League and Girls' Softball League opened the 1971 season. A parade headed by the Agawam High School Band marched from the Church Hall on William Street down Mill Street to the Recreation Field for the Opening Day Ceremonies.
May	23	First Communion Class received Holy Communion. A break- fast for the children was held in the Social Center and each child was given a gift by the Rosary Altar Society.
May	27	Confirmation Class was Confirmed by Most Rev. Thomas R. Man- ning, OFM. Three hockey teams were entered into the Greater Springfield Junior Hockey League. One 8–10 year old team, one 10–12 year
		old team and one 12–14 year old team. In all there are 72 children on these teams. The 10–12 year old team won the Championship of their league. The 8–10 year old team was leading their league the middle of May. These hockey teams were organized in 1965.

#### HISTORY OF THE PARISH

During the infant years of Feeding Hills, the Catholic people attended churches in North Agawam, West Springfield and Springfield, with the hope that someday they would have a church of their own.

In 1926, a portable wooden Chapel, which had been used as St. Anthony's Church in North Agawam, was moved to William Street in Feeding Hills. It was a Mission Chapel of Mount Carmel Church and the Stigmatine Fathers celebrated Mass here each Sunday.

In June of 1944, Rev. Adolph Ferrari, CSS, was placed in charge of the Mission Church of Feeding Hills.

In February of 1946, the late Bishop Thomas O'Leary declared a Territorial Parish in Feeding Hills. The place of worship was to be at the Sacred Heart Church on William Street.

In June of 1946, Rev. Leonard Della Badia, CSS, was assigned as first Pastor of the Sacred Heart Church. At the time of its founding, the Parish consisted of 175 families. The portable Church could only seat 125 people, and was much too small for the growing community. From 1946 to 1959, the Parishioners worked and saved and prayed that they might be able to build a Church large enough for all the Catholics in Feeding Hills.

In 1948, through the untiring efforts of Father Leonard Della Badia, approximately 12 acres of land were purchased at the corner of Springfield, Mill and Poplar Streets on which the new Church, Social Center and Recreation area then stand.

Father George Linse, CSS was assigned as Pastor of Sacred Heart Church in June of 1956, and worked feverishly for a new Church, and on June 20, 1959, the new Church was dedicated, and the first Mass was celebrated in the new Church on Sunday, June 21, 1959.

Because of the hundreds of children attending Sunday School Classes and CCD Classes, it became necessary to build a building for these Church affairs. Through the untiring efforts of Father Linse, the Bishop approved the erection of our new Social Center in the year 1970, and this beautiful building was completed and dedicated on January 17, 1971.
